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Wimbotsham History Trail

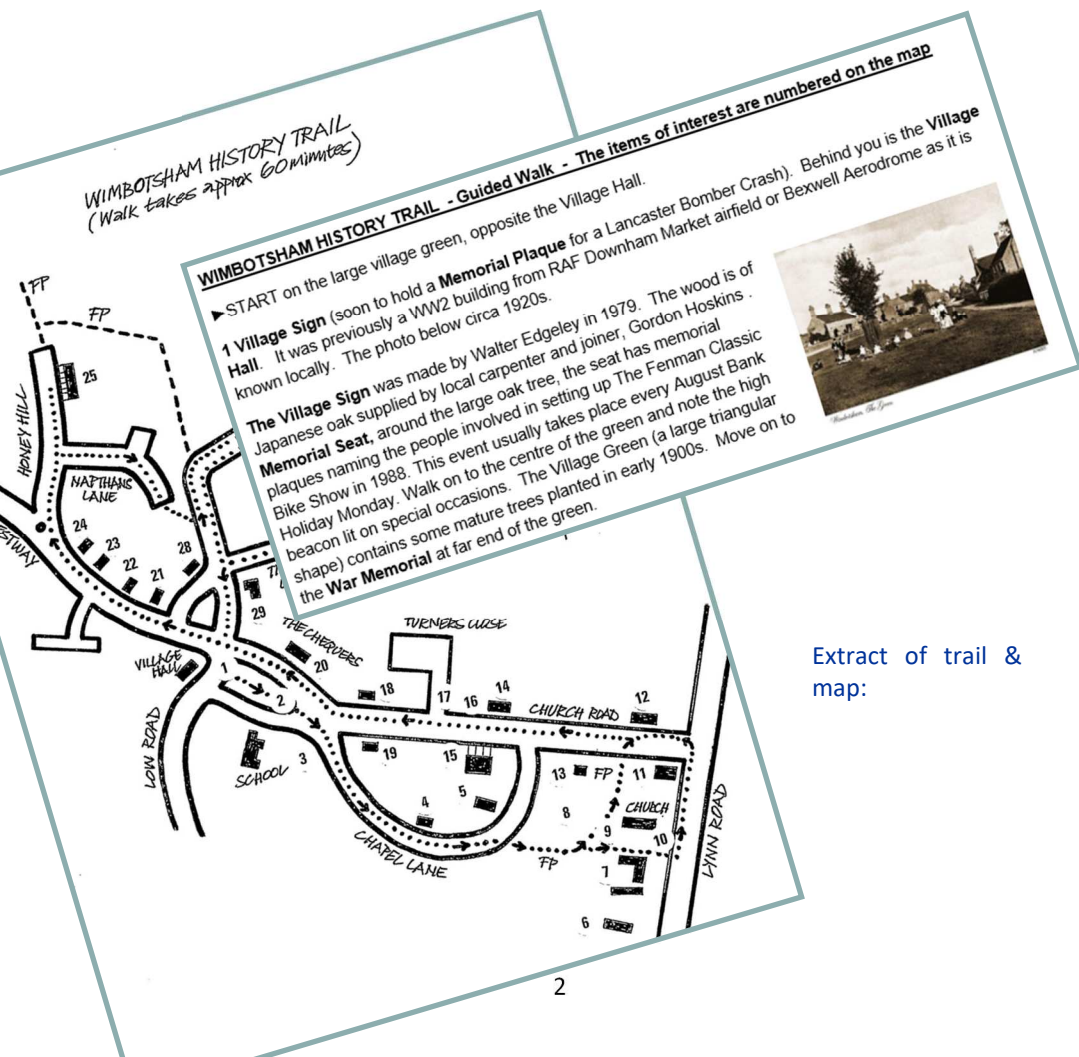
The Wimbotsham village history group led by Carolyn Seymour have been working hard to develop a Wimbotsham history trail complete with map.

Annual Parish Meeting: The annual parish meeting was held on 24th May with a small number of village residents. See report on page 6.

New Chairman: Immediately after the annual parish meeting the first parish council meeting of the new parish council year takes place. At this meeting the parish council Chairman is elected for the year. After 8 years as Chairman, Jackie Squires decided to stand down, stating she felt it time for a new Chairman. Ian Cable was elected Chairman, having been vice Chairman for a number of years. Ian's first task was to thank Jackie for her hard work and leadership over the years. Jackie will remain a parish councillor Dean Chilvers was elected vice chairman.

Asset Walk: At the start of the new parish year an asset walk by parish councillors takes place to inspect the village assets, these include benches, signs, bins, notice boards and similar assets owned by the parish council. Following the walk a schedule of works is being drawn up including cleaning and repairs. If you spot something needing repair in the village let us know.

Wild flower planting: The planting at the entrance to Turners Close has taken well and is now flowering, part of a parish council initiative to encourage wildlife.

Vacancy: We hope to co opt a new parish councillor at our next meeting following an application from a village resident who has attended number of meetings as a member of the public and submitted an application. There are currently two vacancies for parish councillors. If you are interested in becoming a councillor we encourage you to attend two or three meetings to find out if it might be for you.

Highways: We continue to report matters to highways for action, particularly when Highway rangers make periodic visits to carry out maintenance. Current concerns include: Footpath towards Downham Market on Lynn Road being overgrown causing a danger to pedestrians having to step into the fast road. The pathway to Stow Bardolph has been cleared, we will request re surfacing.



CIL Funding: Please support our application for funding for footway to Stow Bridge. This will be a great safety improvement.

Annual Parish Meeting May 2022

Every year the Parish Council hold an annual parish meeting, as advertised within the notice boards and on our website **Wimbotsham.com**. This year held in Methodist Room as the village hall was busy.

The intention is that this gives the parish council and opportunity to report to village residents and for residents to report to the council, positive or negative. A number of village residents attended together with borough councillors. Post covid we have seen less parishioners attend the meetings, though hopefully a positive reflection that villagers are generally content with the governance of the village.

At the meeting the parish council chairman presents their annual report, copy below.

Chairman's Report: *Good evening everyone. Welcome to our Annual Parish Meeting. We are grateful to those who have attended tonight.*

This report looks back over the year and briefly covers the work the PC has been involved in over that time.

New housing: Persimmon Homes will be building the development of 240 new houses on land north east of Bridle Lane in Downham Market. This land is within the boundary of Wimbotsham Parish and as such we are consultees for the development. We asked Persimmon representatives to meet with us last summer and outlined are main concerns that the development and its lighting will have on the quality of the landscape in that prime elevated area.

We objected to the planning application and also objected in person at the Borough Council planning committee hearing.

Several other planning issues in the village were raised and we duly passed them onto the planning enforcement department at the BC.

We keep a close eye on our village assets and hold an asset register. Assets include signposts, village sign, seating, footpaths and trods, village greens, small and large, dog poo bins, notice boards, village hall etc. Annually we carry out an asset walk which highlights any repairs required and opportunities for improvements in the village. (To improve the biodiversity in the village we have had planted a wild flower seed mix at Turners Close.)

You will have noticed we have a SAM2 machine being used in the village. SAM2 records the speeds of travelling cars and flashes their speed if they drive faster than the permitted 30mph. We share the use of SAM2 with Runcton Holme PC. The machine records data which is downloaded giving a record of traffic movement through the village. Approximately 800 drivers go through per day, 12% of which

are speeding. Highest speed recorded 45mph.

Last summer the PC worked with the Chequers and the BC to successfully find a way forward for the pub to continue playing live music outside without causing a noise nuisance for Wimbotsham residents. So far there has been no further complaints and we are hoping the matter has been resolved.

With permission from landowners, Albanwise, the PC has improved safety along the Low road by erecting a piece of fencing alongside the trod to prevent walkers and especially children from running across the road from the recreation ground. The road here is on a bend with poor visibility.

A new Oak tree will be planted this Autumn on the village green. This will replace the old Lime tree that had reached the end of its life and required felling. One of the Sycamores in the middle of green has also been felled as it was blocking light to the grass beneath and blocking a line of sight from the school to the Chequers.

Residents will hopefully appreciate the regularly mowed path now running from Chapel Lane to the back of the Church. This path is now separated from the field by fencing, making a safer route for walkers to use it.

A village litter pick took place last autumn, as usual plenty to go at. Thank you to residents who joined in with this.

The Parish council received £6,359 of CIL funding (Community Infrastructure Levy). This levy is as a result of the new houses built along Bridle Lane and is part of the planning process. The money has restrictions on how it can be used.

The Parish Council continues to deal with parishioners concerns by either signposting them to the relevant service of managing them within their own capabilities and limitations. We regularly respond and comment on all planning applications that affect the parish. We continue to report any potholes to Norfolk County Council Highway rangers and ensure our public rights of way and trods are kept accessible to all walkers. We keep an ongoing eye on the village, ensuring it is kept as tidy as possible.

Thank you to all my fellow parish councillors who all volunteer for this role and to our Parish Clerk who we rely on heavily.

Wimbotsham to Stow Bridge Trod (footpath)

PLEASE support this application with a short email:

With the cost of fuel rising, and the governments drive to promote healthy lifestyles, part of their aim is to link communities with bus routes, cycle paths and footpaths.

As more of us turn to exercise as a means to achieving this, there is a strong argument for the installation of a 'trod' or footpath between Wimbotsham and Stow Bridge.

Many people walk, cycle and run between the two villages, but have to walk or run on this fast section of road due to the lack of a footpath, and this exposes them to risk from traffic especially in the tree lined areas where they are hard to see. This road is a 60mph road, and is used by walkers, with and without dogs, cyclists and joggers, especially some who use it as a means for recreation and taking children to school. People from Wimbotsham use it as a means to go shopping at Sargeant's butchers and Landymore's Farm Shop and to have tea and cake at the Tea Room. Some continue to the River or Wood Lakes. Moving pedestrians to a trod will improve safety and make for a more relaxed walk or run, and hopefully encourage others to use the route too. And, send a message to drivers that vulnerable road users are about.

A recent combined effort by Wimbotsham and Stow Bridge parish councils to secure funding towards the installation of a trod was unfortunately unsuccessful, as we were lacking evidenced support from those who want to see this built. Some of you have spoken parish councilors and shown support, but we would urge (and ask) you to support our next application by simply emailing a few words to wimbotshampc@hotmail.co.uk to show your support (**before 24th July!**), or contact one of the parish Councillors listed in this newsletter giving your contact details.

The installation of this footpath would make the journey for those traversing the road between the villages, safer and more pleasant. It would also make them a more viable place to visit with the attractions of local facilities such as the Chequers village shop, river banks, Landymores café, Bearts and Sergeants butchers being more accessible.

Please show your support and make our villages a more pleasant and accessible place to visit. ***Thank you!***

A letter we have received:

Dear Parish Council,

On behalf of at least three residents I have spoken to, they have asked me to convey their disappointment that the application to install a 'trod' between the villages of Wimbotsham and Stow Bridge was turned down. Two of these are regular walkers to the veg shop and butchers, and find that when they have to use the road, the close proximity of traffic gives cause for concern. Another person walks for exercise, as do two others I know of, and all are agreed that a trod is a much needed way to safely traverse by foot between the villages. During school times I know of at least one person who walks with a pushchair and two children to and from school along this busy road. The activities identified by these people surely fit in with what the borough council and the wider desire of government is, in that they wish to promote less cars being used for the school run, and to promote healthy lifestyles.

There are many walking groups that potentially would also use the trod, along with running clubs. This perhaps may encourage more visitors to the area and see an increase in use of our local facilities.

I would ask that the above is considered and ask that we resubmit an application for funding for this project which would be of immense value to the local communities.

Wimbotsham New Village Hall Working Group

Community Update

In January 2019, A Community Survey was completed and delivered to each Wimbotsham village resident asking their views on what facilities they would like to be included in the proposed new village hall.

In February 2020, and based on the villager's response from the survey, Swann Edwards, an Architectural Consultant, was commissioned to produce a Feasibility Study to look at all options for siting a new village hall.

On the 4 August 2020, the NVHWG, held an event to publicise the results of the Feasibility Study and obtain the views of the residents as to which of the 10 options they would like us to take forward to the next step. From feedback received the majority view was to go forward on two options on two different sites

1) to replace the existing village hall with a new one the existing site.

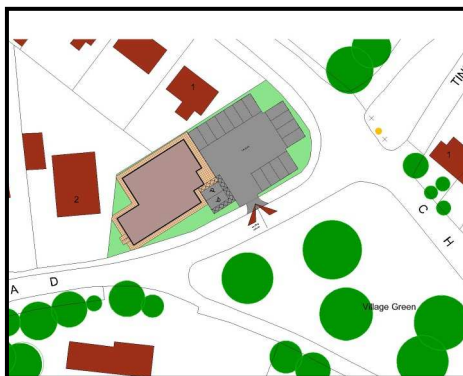
2) to build a new village hall on the recreation ground site.

In December 2021, Swann Edwards submitted request for pre-application advice to the Borough Council for their comments and advice regarding the two sites.

In April 2022, the Borough Council responded to the pre-application request for both options 1 and 2, with their comments and advice. The Borough Council indicated that both sites would have the possibility of planning approval subject to some amendments and more detailed designs being submitted. The following points were made:

1) to replace the existing village hall with a new one the existing site.

This option is acceptable in principle there are considerations with regards highways and parking, conservation and design, neighbouring amenities together with boundary treatments etc.



2) to build a new village hall on the recreation ground site.

This option is acceptable in principle however there are lots of considerations with



regards highways and parking, upgrade of the existing access, Public Right of Way (Chapel Lane), archaeological exploration of the recreation ground site, conservation and design, neighbouring amenities together with boundary treatments etc.

Residents will have the opportunity to discuss the findings with members of the NVHWG at our stand at the

Midsummer Fayre on the 25 June 2022. Information boards will be on display to show the two potential sites.

What's Next? Wimbotsham NVHWG will be collecting feedback from villagers and hall users on the two possible options and making a decision which option to take forward to the next stage.

The group is also continuing working towards becoming a Charitable Incorporated Organisation. This is a formal structure recognised by the Charity Commission and means we will be able to approach funding sources for grants etc.

As we move to the next stage the group is interested to hear from anyone else who may be interested in getting involved, we will need help with everything from funding applications to social media to fundraising.

Please pass on my thanks to Leeane, she is a credit to your staff, always friendly and ready to help and goes out of her way to do so.

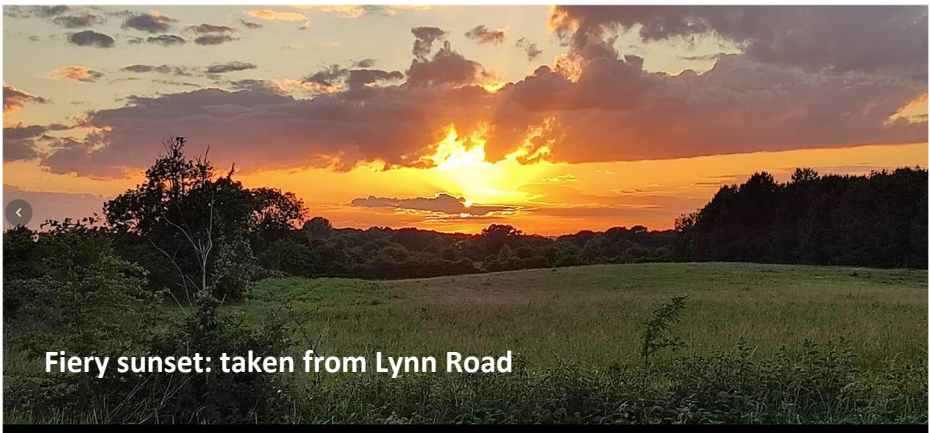

The Wild Service Tree - Quick facts

Common name: Wild Service Tree

Scientific name: *Sorbus torminalis*

Family: Rosaceae

Origin: native



This deciduous broadleaf tree can reach 25m when mature. The bark is brown and patterned with cracked, square plates, and the twigs are slender, shiny, grey-brown and straight.

Look out for: the leaves which have 3–4 unequal lobes. Not to be confused with Maple (*Acer campestre*) as they have similarly shaped leaves, but those of the wild Service Tree are not as distinctly lobed. Identified in winter by the green buds, which are not hairy.

Leaves

Leaf buds are rounded and green, like little peas, and form on short leaf stalks. The lobed leaves are similar to maple, and turn a rich, coppery red before falling in autumn.

Flowers

The wild service tree is hermaphrodite, meaning both male and female reproductive parts are contained within each flower. They form in clusters in late spring to early summer and are pollinated by insects.

Fruits

Once pollinated, the flowers develop into green-brown oval fruits (sometimes called chequers), 10–15 mm diameter and patterned with small, pale spots when mature in mid to late autumn. It can also propagate itself by suckers. The fruit require 'bletting' (ie. decomposition) through freezing to make them edible.

Where to find wild service tree

Although rare, it is often found in oak and ash woods and pockets of ancient woodland. It grows best in clay and lime-based soils. The wild service tree is native to the UK and parts of Europe, Africa and Asia. The wild Service Tree is an ancient-woodland indicator. If you spot it while you're out exploring, it could be a sign you're standing in a rare and special habitat. Can one be found in Wimbotsham?

Value to wildlife

The flowers provide pollen and nectar for insects, while the berries are eaten by birds. The leaves are eaten by caterpillars of the moths *Bucculatrix bechsteinella* and *Phyllonorycter mespilella*.

Mythology and symbolism

The fruits, also known as 'chequers', are said to taste like dates and were given to children as sweets. The fruits can also be used to flavour other alcoholic drinks, such as whisky. It is thought they influenced the naming of 'Chequers Inns', although it is unclear which came first – the name of the fruit, or the inns. (*Public Houses with the name of The Chequers, often display a chequer board on their sign.*)

Magpie Centre News

MAGPIE RIDERS FLY HIGH AT REGIONAL COMPETITION



Disabled riders from throughout East Anglia gathered at the College of West Anglia's Milton campus on Sunday May 8 to contest the Riding for the Disabled Association (RDA) Regional Dressage competition.

Riders are grouped according to their level of disability, and of the West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled team, based at the Magpie Centre, Wallington Hall, five of the six strong team placed first or second in their classes, and won through to the RDA National Championships, to be held at Hartpury College, near Gloucester, on July 15/17.

Seasoned competitors Michelle Alflatt and Aynsley Calvert, riding new mounts, Sully and Ava, respectively, both won their classes. Michelle piloted Sully to victory, with an excellent mark of 69.3%, while Aynsley won both his dressage class and the Countryside Challenge qualifier. This last is like a mounted obstacle course and, despite Ava stopping to peer at a cardboard hen, the pair achieved top marks.

Said Michelle: 'Sully was a very good girl, and I was delighted with my marks. I just hope we can consolidate this with a win at the Nationals.'

But competing at the Nationals doesn't come cheap, so, although the riders pay their own entry fees, plus travel and accommodation costs, West Norfolk RDA will need to foot the bill for horse transport and stabling, as well as staff transport and accommodation.

Watch this space to find out how you can help.

Entries are still open for the Charity Ride, scheduled for June 12, with routes of various lengths, around Wallington Hall estate. The shorter ride is even suitable for riders on lead rein, so, even if the ground remains hard, but you and your horse fancy a gentle saunter, off-road, in lovely surroundings, visit our website; www.rda-westnorfolk.org.uk for details of how to enter.
