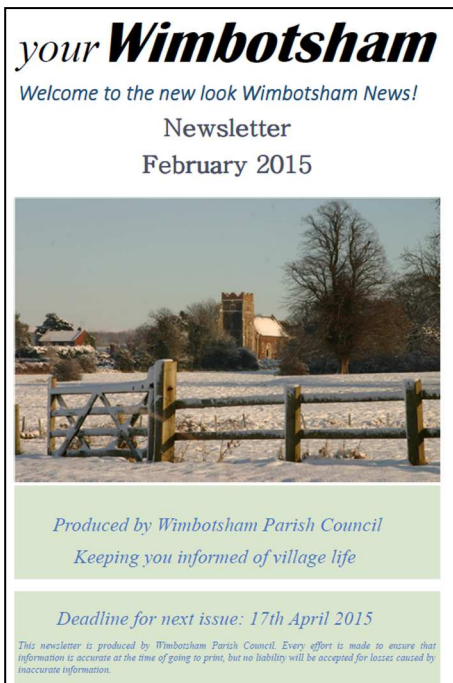

There has been one **parish councillor vacancy** for over a year, as of now there are two vacancies. On the following page is an extract from the 2015 newsletter with thirteen excuses for not joining the parish council!

Again please come to a meeting to see if you may be able to contribute.

In fact the theme of this newsletter is all about contributing to the village. The **village hall is at premature threat of closure** if volunteers do not come forward to help run the hall. It does not run itself! The risk is that if people do

The recreation ground is looking for volunteers too.

So it seems that renewed community spirit is needed to keep the village going. So we urge you all to consider stepping up and putting something back into the village. The more the merrier, with many hands making light work it can be enjoyable, rewarding and sociable working together. But with only a few it becomes hard work and less enjoyable. So please join in!

There is **Good News from the church**, planning permission has been approved for re building a modern church building! An exciting opportunity for the village to gain a new worship space with the flexibility for other community uses, to bring the church and the wider village together. We look forward to seeing the re building over the next year or so.

Annual Parish Council Meeting was held on Tuesday 14th May 2024, with members of the public attending together with representatives from the recreation ground, history group, St Marys church, Methodist Church and Allotments, each providing a report on their group. The parish council chairman then gave his annual report on the work of the parish council. The report can be found on the website **Wimbotsham.com** the chairman concluded by announcing he would be standing down as chairman and parish

councillor.

The Annual Parish Meeting was followed by the Annual Parish Council Meeting where the outgoing chairman conducted the election of new chairman and vice chairman. Dean Chilvers was elected chairman, with Chris Hitchens being elected vice chairman.

Borough councillor Vivien Spikings formally thanked the outgoing chairman for his hard work, stating he would be missed and his knowledge would be a loss to the parish council.

The outgoing chairman thanked councillors for their support during his 10 years of service and wished the new chairman good luck in his new role.

Parish Council Meeting: A good internal audit report was received, credit to the now not so new clerk, new council policies were adopted, again these can be found on the website. An update on the new footway linking with Broomhill was received, this has again been delayed by NCC and the PC have asked Liz Truss to take up the matter with NCC.

Cleaning of war memorial was approved and plans for **D day** were finalised, **see poster on back cover of** newsletter. The need for volunteers and potential closure of village hall was discussed.

Parish Councillor Vacancy

Thirteen Excuses for Not Joining the Parish Council!

1. "I'm too young". If you are 18 you are old enough.
2. "What's the point of just joining a talking shop, they don't do anything". Have you ever been to a meeting? Basing your judgement on watching The Vicar of Dibley is definitely not valid.
3. "I haven't got any planning application in at the moment". Putting in for planning has got nothing to do with sitting on the Council, whatever may have happened years ago. In fact, if your own application is discussed by the Council, you must leave the room.
4. "I'm too busy, I couldn't commit to attending every single meeting". Meetings are rarely more frequent than one evening every six weeks, and missing the occasional one is perfectly acceptable. Most meetings take less than 1½ hours.
5. "I'm concentrating on finding a job or furthering my career". Being a local Councillor is a definite plus point to add to a CV. It shows you can make decisions, work in a team, are community minded and pro-active. Prospective employees will be impressed.
6. "I haven't lived here very long and I don't know the area well". If you have lived or worked in the Parish for a year you are eligible. Your views as an 'incomer' should be welcomed, as you will probably see things more objectively.
7. "I'm worried that I won't get many votes, and look silly". Even if you are not voted on this time, you may very well be approached if a vacancy occurs in the future and co-opted on.

Thirteen Excuses for Not Joining the Parish Council!

8. "Our Parish Council is full of Old Fogey". Join up and change it then.
9. "I'd look like a fool because I would not know what's going on". You will be eased in gently; there is help, advice and more formal training available. The Clerk is the legal officer in the Council, and he or she will explain the rules.
10. "I'll have to sign that code of conduct thing that the press keeps on about". The code of conduct is nowhere near as onerous as made out by the press; out of some 80,000 councillors, only 300 have refused to sign. The code stops situations like the planning one above.
11. "I'll have to let everyone know about all my personal and business affairs". The declaration of interest asks you to declare business interests within the Parish area, to guard against bias when Parish issues are debated. As for personal affairs, get real, everyone knows about these already.
12. "I'm too lazy and not interested in my community". An excellent reason for not joining.
13. "I prefer to let others do the work and then criticize from the sidelines afterwards". Also a valid reason for not joining, but do bear in mind that expounding your views in the pub, rather than the council chamber will not change a thing in your Parish.

Village Hall at threat of closure

Sadly, without new volunteers to help run the village hall it faces closure, unfortunately this is a real possibility being discussed by the parish council. The parish council does not have the resource to run the hall and the hall does not have sufficient income to pay staff.

There are only a few active members of the existing village hall committee and some of these wish to step down after a number of years service. Including Kate, the volunteer bookings clerk and treasurer, Kate has looked after the bookings and finances for over 5 years, whilst Kate enjoys the role her professional life has become ever busier. As Kate has taken on a more senior management role, it is no longer practical for Kate to take such an active role in running the village hall. So with regret Kate informed us last year that she would be stepping down from 31st March this year.

Unfortunately we have been unable to find a replacement volunteer. The roles are not super onerous for the right

person, but do require a degree of flexibility and enthusiasm with ad hoc responding to telephone and email enquiries, taking bookings, payments and so on.

Other volunteers are also required to help with tasks such as checking the hall, arranging occasional maintenance, housekeeping, such as raking the gravel, checking the toilet rolls, a little tidying and all those little tasks which are required to operate the building and keep it open.

And, with a few more volunteers we might be able to organise more events to help finance the hall, which is currently running at a loss due to the limited number of bookings, which have declined.

It would be great to be able to hold events such as bingo, more coffee mornings, quiz nights, and whatever ideas people come up with?

There are around 700 people in the village, so we need less than 1% of you to volunteer. Please don't be the 99% that do not!

Cafe Connect - our village cafe

You have probably seen the posters on notice boards and around the village advertising our Village Cafe. So how did it start and what's it all about? From community events held over the years, the Parish Council has seen how people enjoy gathering together to celebrate, meet with friends, make new friends and share food and often reminisce. To make this a more regular opportunity the idea of a community cafe was born and two of the Parish Councillors have taken the project forward.

Cafe Connect is open the first Saturday of every month from 10-12 in the village hall. Our third Cafe Connect took place early April and as word has spread, so has the attendance. We are also receiving very positive customer feedback

The recent funeral scandals in Hull have been distressing to the families concerned and we feel for them. Thankfully, the local funeral directors we work with in West Norfolk have been carefully selected and proven to be reliable. As Christians, we are Easter people, who mourn with those who mourn but always with the hope of the resurrection!

Still, we must be wise enough to think and plan for our funerals. Parishioners who live in the parish can avail themselves of the privilege of having a Church funeral and burial in the churchyard. The service will have to be according to the rites of the Church of England and the fees are moderate. As a guide, a full Church funeral service followed by burial in the churchyard will cost under £820 in total. It is good for the environment too! You don't have to be a regular churchgoer to be able to use your parish church, although the service will be dignified and traditional (not too different from that of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth !!).

St Marys Church Update

Good News!

The Rector, Churchwardens and Church Council of St Mary's are exceptionally pleased to be able to inform our wonderful village that St Mary's has been granted full and unconditional planning approval to go ahead with the redevelopment of the church building.

Yesterday (May 7th) the sub-committee attended a very long session at King's Lynn Town Hall where, at the end of a long list of planning concerns for West Norfolk, was the case for St Mary's. Following the submission of a pre-application scheme in March 2022 the Borough Council's Conservation Department and Historic England insisted on several changes being made. The church council and our architects (Freeland Rees Roberts) had to work hard to ensure the changes met both the needs of the church and fulfilled the Borough Council's Planning Department's requirements.

Our first draft drawing for an extension on the south side of the nave was deemed to be 'too boxy'. 'Could you present something more resembling an aisle on that side of the church'? Away we go. Four amended drawings and plans later the two auspicious bodies were starting to like what they were seeing, though this wasn't until the possibility of removing some of the south wall in the process had been refused by the church council. Apart from anything else we thought it was unnecessary and the cost of such a design was far beyond the scope of the insurance claim, in addition to already having a perfectly adequate door in the south wall of the church.

Built-in photovoltaic panels producing solar energy on the south nave roof were initially considered too futuristic until we pointed out that both King's College Chapel Cambridge and St Peter Mancroft in Norwich both have schemes in progress and it being the policy of the Church of England that all of its buildings *should* be carbon neutral by 2030. What would be the point of retro-fitting these items when we can build them into the design now?

Heating the building is planned to be by Air Source Heat Pumps. These will supply hot water to an internal heating system either via trench heaters or underfloor means to heat the interior, the PV panels solar generation offsetting the cost of the electricity.

Because so much of the building has been lost to the fire it enables us to

incorporate much higher levels of insulation, particularly in the roof, than would nominally be the case. The wall plaster finish will also incorporate thermal heat loss properties. Windows will be secondarily glazed and external doors fitted with gaskets to reduce heat loss.

The extension building, as well as housing lavatories, a kitchen and 'gathering space', will also shelter and protect the important Norman doorway built around 1150AD from future weathering.

At length the church council has satisfied all statutory bodies including our own Ely Diocesan Advisory Committee and we are confident we can present a revitalised church building to the community that is fit for the purpose of both worship and community use for the 21st Century and well beyond.

Of course, as we are 'church' the process has been as much the work of prolonged prayer as well as statutory procedure.

The Parochial Church Council would like to thank everyone who supported the application via the KL&WNBC website. We are very grateful to you all. We intend to exhibit more detailed plans in an open afternoon at the Village Hall in the not-too-distant future.

Irene Rumball 1924 – 2023

Many people in Wimbotsham will have heard that Irene passed away last autumn, just 3 months short of her 100th birthday.

Irene's parents Albert Edley and Gladys Willings moved around England after he became an Anglian priest, with Edley's last appointment as Rector of Barton Bendish in 1954, retiring in 1963.

Both Gladys and Edley were involved with the scouting movement, Edley becoming a Scout Commissioner and Gladys working with the Girl Guide Rangers.



Irene met William (known as John) when he was the Treasurer at Barton Bendish, where his father was a churchwarden. John was the manager of the Trustee Savings Bank in Downham Market. Irene and John were married at St Faith's Church, Kings Lynn in 1972. At the age of 17, John enlisted in the Signals Regiment and served during WW2 with most of his service then being in India.

During WW2, and to support the war effort, women had no choice as to where they were sent by the government. In 1944 Irene was sent to Slough to work in nursery education. Her nursery looked after 80 children from ages 2-5 years. They occupied 2 Nissen huts. Taking the register each day was problematic because they also had to take money for meals and not all children stayed for all meals. The costs were Breakfast 3d. Lunch 6d. and Tea 3d. Their mothers were required to work to fill the job vacancies left when men enlisted for WW2 service. Whilst in Slough, Irene went on a course in Stafford to study remedial teaching.

In 1972, John and Irene's first home was at 4 Westway (or 49 The Street) Wimbotsham built in 1704. Soon after her marriage Irene assumed a volunteer role in Wimbotsham School, assisting the teachers 2/3 days a week which continued for 25 years. Their marriage was short, as sadly John died in 1980. Irene then moved to a smaller property at 19 Westway in 1983 and remained there until last year.

John and Irene had one son, Michael, followed by 4 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren. Michael was a regular soldier in the Signals Regiment and enlisted when he left Downham Secondary Modern Boys School. He was in the second wave after the invasion of The Falkland Islands. After leaving the army, he became a dog trainer but died in a tragic accident in 2014.

Irene joined Wimbotsham W.I. in 1972 enjoying knitting and sewing. In her later years Irene kept herself busy reading, completing crosswords and knitting squares to make blankets to raise money for Tapping House Hospice.
